Kicking off the new year, Leadership Delaware Class of 2024 met for their fifth session at the <u>Willis Education Cen-</u> <u>ter</u> on Thursday, January 11th, 2024. Our facilitators throughout the day were Barb Lyon, <u>Lyon & Co</u>. and Gina Grote, <u>United Way of Delaware County</u>, both representing the Leadership class of 2012. While having breakfast, the class had another speed dating round and the question that stumped most participants was "What was the name of your 1st grade school teacher?"

After breakfast, the facilitators set the tone for the day with an inspiring affirmation: "The attitude you bring to the day is what the day will bring to you. Great attitude. Great day." The focus of the day was then noted as perception vs perspective. The first segment of discussion was based on the Wage Gap video and The Way We Think About Charity is Dead Wrong TED Talk by Dan Pallotta. The video prompted the class to explore the challenges of digging one and their family out of poverty and the unresolved issue for a collaborative approach to impact change. Research was shown in the video by highlighting an individual that started out by making minimum wage and continued tracking their wage throughout the years. Although their hourly rate gradually increased throughout the years, a gap was depicted and showed how they

still found themselves back in and out of poverty over time. The gap was created due to the fact that their welfare benefits and food stamps were decreasing at a faster rate than their salary was increasing. The video wrapped up by showing that it was not until the individual was making three times the amount of their starting wage that they were finally out of the poverty cycle (which could take them years and years to accomplish).

Open conversation led to the reflection that anyone in the group can find themselves trying to escape poverty whether it is before, now, and/or in the future. The TED Talk gave an overview of our existing broken relationship with charities. Dan noted poverty has continued to remain at 12% worldwide for the past 40 years. Society has structured for folks that choose a career in helping others to not make as much money as those choosing not to help others. Dan sheds a light on the disparity in CEO wages



and the limited share of GDP allocated to non-profits. The TED talk concluded by pointing out non-profits will continue to face an uphill battle of scale and the need for a shift in perspective on social innovation.

Class then segwayed into a roundtable discussion to share overall feelings and ideas on charity. Some of those thoughts included the following:

- Everyone needs to help in some way.
- Are all charities focusing on growing their charity?
- Getting welfare benefits can be tricky and can be hard to check off all the requirement criteria to get any support.
- Charities are failing to invest in tech and are getting farther and farther behind (funding/grants that charities receive can have strict requirements which hinder technology advancements)
- There is only a finite number of dollars in the world, and supporting one cause means contributing less to another cause.
- Media can hurt your perspective.

Holly Quaine then led a discussion with our class regarding Boardsmanship, sharing valuable insights on the various types of nonprofit and not-for-profit entities. Holly discussed the roles and fiduciary responsibilities of board members, and advised the group on the many things to consider prior to accepting a board appointment. Serving on a board requires understanding conflicts of interest, recruitment processes, financial commitments, and the importance of learning and respecting the entity.

Next, a panel of representatives from several **Delaware County** community service agencies were introduced which included the following entities: Kristine Hodge and Chase Waits (**Delaware County Board of Developmental Disabilities**), Deanna Brant (**Delaware-Morrow Mental Health & Recovery Services Board**), Jeffrey Sell and Deanna Roberts (**Delaware County Department of Job & Family Services**) and Adam Howard (**Delaware Public Health District**). Each provided an overview of their agencies and roles in our community, and shared details regarding their various programs and services. Following their presentations, the panel members answered questions from the class and engaged in further discussion regarding the services offered to Delaware County residents.

Following lunch, our class attended small group discussions facilitated by representatives from numerous community service entities. There were five groups focusing on the following topics: Basic Needs, Housing, Mental Health and Addiction Recovery, Aging, and Youth and Veterans. Some of those specific entities representing each topic were the following: <u>Stockhands Horses for Healing</u>, Delaware County Veteran Services, <u>Andrew's House</u>, <u>SourcePoint</u>, <u>People in Need Inc</u>, and <u>Grace Clinics in Ohio</u>.

The class was then divided into several groups for a hands-on activity which consisted of different volunteering opportunities. Activities included cleaning out classrooms, helping organize free school supplies, and going through donated food pantry items.

The day concluded with a call to action – be involved in the community, volunteer, be a voice, and support activities. The quote by Jane Goodall resonates: "What you do makes a difference, and you have to decide what kind of difference you want to make." In reflection, the day offered a comprehensive understanding of Delaware County's social services landscape, the importance of volunteerism, and the responsibilities of boardsmanship. Building bridges and making a difference requires collaboration, a shift in perspective, and a commitment to positive change.

On Veterans Day 1996, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund unveiled a replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C., designed to travel to communities throughout the United States. The exhibit honors the more than three million Americans who served in the U.S. Armed Forces in the Vietnam War. More than 58,000 names of men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice are engraved on The Wall That Heals.

A 53-foot trailer that carries The Wall That Heals will arrive at Havener Park located at 4085 Liberty Road, Delaware, Ohio, on Tuesday, September 10th. The replica wall and a mobile education center will be erected on Wednesday, September 11th. The exhibit will be on display to the public on Thursday, September 12th through Sunday, September 15th.

"It is an honor to be chosen as the hosting site. Our hope is that The Wall That Heals Exhibit will draw visitors from across Ohio and beyond. Let us pay our respects to those who made the ultimate sacrifice for our freedom," said Liberty Township Board Chair Shyra Eichhorn.

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
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
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

Chamber committee meets with legislator

The Chamber of Commerce Government Affairs Subcommittee welcomed House District 61 Representative Beth Lear on Wednesday, January 17th. Representative Lear explained that while things have been a bit slow at the Statehouse that work is progressing on the Capital Budget. Ohio's capital budget for fiscal years 2023 and 2024 totaled \$3.5 billion in appropriations, with most of the revenue going towards the Intel investment in Licking County, public schools, and state parks.

The new "All Ohio Future Fund" will provide an additional \$750 million to local communities to help increase the state's economic development sites. Funding will primarily come in the form of 0% interest loans that may be partially forgivable. Rep. Lear stated that groups with a match will get funded first. Committee members who had submitted applications for the "All Ohio Future Fund" had trouble determining application deadlines and asked Rep. Lear to seek improved communication for future grant applicants.

When asked about her 1st year impressions, Rep. Lear said that with her experience as a legislative aide in the Ohio House, and as a policy analyst for the Buckeye Institute, she was already familiar with how things worked. Since taking office in January 2023 Rep. Lear has sponsored seven bills Including HB 15 to revise consent laws regarding abortion, HB 183 regarding single-sex bathrooms in schools, HB 236, the Never Act Alone Bill, and four House Bills (HB 55, HB 165, HB 294, and HB 330) which establish memorial highways.

Rep. Lear reminded the committee members that elections for the Ohio House of Representatives will take place on November 5, 2024, using the district maps adopted in September 2023. State House Districts 60 and 61, which cover the Delaware area, have been revised so expect some changes when you go to vote. The primary will be held March 19, 2024.
