<u>Marion Technical College</u> (MTC) is proud to announce that Ohio Magazine has recognized five faculty members for Excellence in Education in the December edition. The faculty members are: Christy Culver, Tola Francis-Sanusi, Trish Frazzini, Chad Hensel, and Lillie Kirsch.



"Our faculty are being recognized statewide for excellence," said Dr. Ryan McCall, president of MTC. "It shows their commitment to quality and innovation."

Christy Culver serves as a professor of business and information technology. She is also the faculty assessment coordinator. She

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also serves as the conference chair of the Ohio Association for Two-Year Colleges (OATYC). Marion Tech hosted the conference this year, bringing award-winning faculty to Marion and sharing innovative practices from institutions across Ohio.

"Christy is an amazing teacher who is always pushing the limits of technology and innovating in the class-room," said Mike White, Director of Business and Information Technology.

Culver has a Master of Education in Curriculum and Instruction from Ashland University, a Bachelor of Science in Comprehensive Business Education from Ashland University, and an Associate of Applied Business from MTC. She won the Teacher of the Year from the OATYC in 2009, as well as Post-Secondary Business Technology Educator of the Year in 2009 by OBTA, an association for business technology educators, and

the Post-Secondary Business Teacher of the Year by North Central Business Education Association in 2010.

Tola Francis-Sanusi is a professor of business. She prides herself on building personal relationships with her students and always having her door open for students. She is also leading MTC's first study abroad trip, which will take students,

faculty, staff and community members to London and Paris in March 2020.

"Tola is a leader in the business technologies department at where she is leading the study abroad initiative and guided pathways at Marion Technical College," White shared. "She is committed to student success."

Francis-Sanusi has a Master's of Business Administration from the University of Phoenix, a Bachelor of Science from the College of Staten Island and a Bachelor of Science in Computing from the University of Greenwich



Trish Frazzini is a professor of human and social services. She also serves as a practicum coordinator for students in ten counties, helping students gain valuable, practical experience.

"Trish is an instrumental part of MTC's Human and Social Service program and has helped lead MTC's effort to mitigate the non-cognitive barriers such as food insecurity and housing challenges faced by many MTC students," said Bob Haas, Chief Strategy Officer and incoming Interim Chief Academic Officer. "Trish is being recognized for her outstanding teaching and for helping establish MTC's Connection Center."

Frazzini has a Bachelor of Social Work from Capital University and a Master of Science in Social Administration from Case Western Reserve University. She also has an Associate of Applied Science in Human and Social Services from MTC.



Lillie Kirsch is the Director of Human and Social Services here at MTC. She helped create the program. She and Frazzini have championed the Welcoming Committee to help all students feel accepted.

Kirsch recently was awarded a \$5,000 Believe in Students grant to help support through the FAST Fund (Faculty and Students Together.) With a matching gift from the Baldauf Foundation and additional donations from faculty and staff, students will be able to receive small grants for emergency financial assistance. These small grants will ensure that an empty gas tank or a needed car repair will not prevent struggling students from graduating.

Kirsch has a Master of Social Work from The Ohio State University, a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology from Capital University and an Associate in Applied Science in Human Services from North Central Technical College.

"Lillie and Trish both care deeply for their students and are engaged in many college efforts for inclusivity and diversity," said Jamilah Jones Tucker, Dean of Arts and Sciences.

Dr. Chad Hensel is the director of MTC's physical therapist assistant (PTA) program. He is still a practicing physical therapist



with OhioHealth Marion Medical Campus. This program is extremely successful, with a passing rate on the national exam of 94%, much higher than the national average. There is a 100% employment rate for graduates as PTAs after they passed the licensing exam.

"Chad always seeks to improve his teaching and learning by attending conferences such as the Education Leadership Conference sponsored by APTA. He brings new ideas and creative techniques back to the classroom where he fully engages his student in the classroom and labs," shared Debbie Stark, Dean of Technical & Professional Programs at MTC. "He is a positive motivator for good health with both his students and his MTC colleagues!"

PTA is a growing field, expected to increase in demand by 27% over the next decade with an average salary in our area of \$61,423.

Hensel has a Doctor of Physical Therapy and Master of Health Science from University of Indianapolis and a Bachelor of Science in Physical Therapy from Bowling Green State University.

New Boat House and Accessible Canoe Launch

The Accessible Canoeing Program at the campus of <u>Recreation Unlimited</u> for the campers of Recreation Unlimited adapts and offers individuals with disabilities and health concerns the opportunity to enjoy canoeing around Lake Crum in a safe environment that fosters focus, increased self-confidence, and team building skills.

Through grant funding, Recreation Unlimited created a design for a Boat House that included an Accessible Canoe Launch, that included an accessible power hoyer lift system in a secured area that will be used for safe transferring of individuals with disabilities from their wheelchairs into the canoes.





The Ginni D. Ragan, John, Kevin and Arin McNamara Families Boat House and Accessible Canoe Launch was opened in June 2019 and was used consistently

throughout the summer months. The consensus from campers and the Recreation Unlimited team is that the canoe program became easier, safer and quicker. Campers who never were able to canoe before got to experience what it was like to be on the water and the Recreation Unlimited team transferred campers from their wheelchairs in a safe manner. All in all, it is a quality building in support of a quality program.

In those cases, we notify via email those who have registered for the event. Those who have not registered and show up at the

venue will be inconvenienced and we apologize. Although we expect walk-ins at the event, we cannot predict how many there will be so we can't include that unknown number in our decision to hold or cancel an event. Often, had we known the number of unregistered walk-ins will attend, we would not have had to cancel the event.

Please understand that holding events is planned around knowing who commits to attending. Often walk-ins impact the room set-up and the amount of food prepared. While we don't discourage walk-ins, we have no way of contacting them. If you find at the last minute that you can attend an event, call the Chamber the day before or the morning of the event to make sure your trip isn't wasted. Bottom line: please register for events. Thank you!

Our Vision

The Delaware Area Chamber of Commerce shall be the region's business leader and community voice.

Our Mission

The Chamber serves as the visionary leader for programs and services benefiting our members by promoting and advocating a favorable business climate, quality of life and the orderly growth and development of the Delaware area community.

The Leadership Delaware class of 2020 started its Education Day at Hayes High School. While there was the normal assortment of breakfast treats and coffee, it surpassed all other Leadership mornings thus far by the accompanying music played by four students from the Hayes Orchestra. The combination of being surrounded by books in the school library and the music from the string quartet was the perfect beginning for a day focused on education. Leadership Delaware heard from five local superintendents in order to develop a better understanding of the current state of our local schools. The superintendents were: Heidi Kegley, Delaware City Schools; Angie Hamberg, Big Walnut Local Schools; Mark Raiff, Olentangy Local Schools; Andy Miller, Buckeye Valley Local Schools; and Mary Beth Freeman with the Delaware Area Career Center (DACC). During opening comments we learned that the total student population of Delaware



County is approximately 32,342 students (compared to 1.8 million total students in Ohio) and that our school districts continue to see a 25% enrollment growth as compared to last decade. This is in stark contrast to Ohio's enrollment growth of 5%. Delaware is the fastest growing district in the state which is a sign of a healthy economy but it does present some challenges for our schools. DACC, Olentangy, Delaware City and Big Walnut all shared details on the demanding challenge of managing enrollment growth and finding needed funding. Year over year growth averages 3% - 5% but funding is not keeping up with the growth. Superintendent Raiff shared that while the average Ohio school receives \$4,800 per pupil, Olentangy, which is considered a high wealth district, receives a fraction of that at only \$600 per pupil. Compare this to private schools that receive \$1,400 per pupil. Buckeye Valley Superintendent Andy Miller shared that while his district is not facing the rapid enrollment growth, they do have to deal with the challenge of a district that covers 206 square miles over four counties. Despite the challenges faced by everyone, Delaware County schools provide high quality educational opportunities for our community. All districts continue to offer innovative college and career readiness programming as we experienced throughout our day.

Following the discussion with the superintendents, we were introduced to Dr. Adonis Bolden, one of the Assistant Principals at Hayes, and to the Hayes Choir Singers. When they started to sing, the atmosphere changed, and the Leadership group



couldn't help but sit in awe. It was inspiring to see and hear a group of students coordinating their voices to create something special. They were fantastic, and they are in demand in the community, performing at twenty events this holiday season. We also heard from a student who told of his initial difficulty in school, and how he was able to change his path by working closely with his teachers and school administrators.

Our next stop was the Olentangy STEM Academy. What an amazing program! The STEM program is a four-year program for students in the Olentangy School District. One hundred students are accepted from the four high schools through a lottery system before their freshman year. It offers a leg up for students interested in science, technology, engineering and math. It is a ½ day program where focus areas include critical thinking, collaboration and creativity. Students spend four years

learning through modeling experiences, conducting research and participating in project based activities. Students work with professionals in a variety of STEM fields to gain real world experiences and mentorship. As we toured the building, students at the STEM Academy shared the state of the art equipment where students use a laser cutter for cardboard, wood and metal, a 3D modeling printing, computers and a welding plasma cutter to complete some of their projects and labs. They build robots, board games and code. The math classroom had desks attached to the chairs that are on wheels for a fluid classroom that encourages group learning. If you have a student that has any interest in these four fields, this is the place to be. The ACT (Academy for Community Transition) is also housed in the Olentangy Academy building. The ACT program is a postsecondary transition program for students that have met all academic requirements and completed four years of high school. It helps students with special needs prepare for real life after graduation. ACT benefits students by fostering connections in the community and the working world. We had the opportunity to meet a few of these students while touring the building as they interacted with the STEM students during their school day.

Our Leadership Delaware class visited <u>Columbus State Community College Delaware Campus</u>. Dean Tina Diggs shared all the great things the Delaware Branch has to offer. Situated on a beautiful 108 acres with a state-of-the-art campus, Columbus State is known not only for its affordability, with 76% of its students taking on zero loan debt, but it is the largest community college in Ohio and the only open admissions college in Central Ohio.

It offers smaller classrooms that create an opportunity for faculty and students to connect. It has a Preferred Pathways Program with nine universities and colleges throughout Ohio. This program enables students to start their college journey at Columbus State and transfer to earn a 4-year degree. They also have Career Programs for those preparing for their first job or seeking a new career. Sixty percent of the students attend school on a part time basis and work 20 or more hours a week. Through College Credit Plus, high school students are also afforded the opportunity to take classes to get a jump start on their college degree. CSCC strives to provide support and engagement opportunities for all students. Columbus State offers a learning center with tutoring, computers, group study rooms, spacious lounge areas, a cyber café and fitness center. They have an array of extracurricular activities including cross country, volleyball and basketball, student clubs and organizations.

After our tour of CSCC, the Leadership Classmates enjoyed an amazing lunch prepared by the students at Delaware Area Career Center. Our three-course meal included a wedge salad, prime rib, garlic mashed potatoes, green beans, and a variety of

deserts, all made from scratch by the DACC culinary students. All participants were also given a box of cookies and candies to take home and share (maybe) with family and friends. After the meal Chad Williams, Director of Adult Operations, gave an overview of the programs offered at the DACC and then broke the Leadership Class into four groups to tour the beautiful facility. The DACC offers programming for both traditional aged high school students and adults. High school students can choose from 24 programs (Exercise Science is the latest program to be added) and also have access to job shadowing and internships. Adult students can attend DACC to complete programs in Fire, EMT, Basic Peace Officer, Nurse Aide or Welding. Introductory computer classes are also offered. Regardless of which program students decided to pursue, all of the facilities are state of the art.



After a wonderful lunch and tour of DACC, the Leadership Delaware class headed



to Conger Elementary where we were greeted by a host of 5th grade ambas-sadors and their teacher as well as one of our own classmates, Principal of Conger Elementary, Josh Page. Josh told us a little history of Conger and about the recent expansion of the elementary to house the growing population of children that attend the school. Conger provides all 5th grade students with iPads to assist them with the growing technology world and expanding their learning capabilities. 5th grade students took our group on a tour of the building. We were able to observe kindergarten and 5th grade classrooms and 2 specialized rooms. The gross motor room was set up with a trampoline, punching bag and other sporting items and the sensory room offered a swing and other sensory activities. These rooms are used for children that need some time to decompress from the over stimulation of a regular classroom setting.

Our next stop was the main branch of the **Delaware County District**

<u>Library</u> which is one of 4 libraries in the Delaware County district. The library is part of a 18 library consortium, where registered cards holders can access items from all over the state and country. The library offers many services including a children's area, a teen room, audio visuals, study rooms and is home to the Delaware County Genealogical Society. The Delaware County District Library hosts a variety of events for all ages including learning events and reading events. A library card holder has

access to not only books but Wi-Fi hotspots, Chromebooks and many other items. The library offers many valuable services and strives to provide innovative programming to meet the changing needs of our community.

Thank you to our amazing facilitators, Joseph Uher and Mark Cooper, who organized an extremely informative day. The Leadership Delaware Class of 2020 had the opportunity to experience the outstanding educational opportunities available to children, adolescents and adults in our community.
